HOSPICE WEDDING

When Ciara realized her mother Eithne, who has scleroderma, was no longer able to travel, she decided that the only thing to do was move her wedding from October in the Catskills to August in Boulder at TRU Hospice Care Center.

A rare disease, scleroderma can present with a laundry list of symptoms, including CREST Syndrome, which causes trouble eating, atrophy in the fingers and toes, and calcium deposits in the skin; and, makes patients prone to frostbite at much higher temperatures. When Eithne's symptoms worsened, Eithne's family reached out to TRU Community Care for hospice services.

Before Ciara's mother entered hospice, the term invoked a lot of sad, scary feelings for the family. But after meeting the TRU intake team and the doctors, nurses, and volunteers who cared for Ciara's mother, the thought of hospice turned to one of relief.

With Ciara's mother's care team in place, Ciara could focus on enjoying her big day with her mother by her side. Ciara couldn't imagine walking down the aisle without her mother, the most important person in her life. Thanks to TRU staff, the wedding went smoothly, and her mother was cared for in a comforting environment as she enjoyed the love and excitement in the room.

After a heartwarming ceremony, Eithne remained at the care center for a while longer until a space was available at a long-term care facilty. TRU continues to care for her now in this setting, allowing her to live with her advanced illness as comfortably, confidently, and fully as possible.
